Minquan Junior High School brought joy to the atmosphere with a student-made video about campus life and cheerful performance songs, causing cheers and surprises from both schools.

As the party came to an end, students from both schools met their pen pals and exchanged unique little gifts. In that face-to-face moment, warmth filled the air as they realized, "Oh,

you're the one I've been writing to!" Coming from across the sea to meet each other, both Taiwanese and Japanese students must have been deeply impressed by this unforgettable moment, cherishing it forever in their hearts.





On 5/31, which was the second day of the exchange, Nagano eighth-grade students led Minquan students on a campus tour in groups. Next was classroom exchange time. Nagano Junior High School has six classes in the junior high division, so Minquan students were divided into six groups to enter each class. Nagano students showed their lively and caring side, and applause and responses echoed back and forth.
